Home-Grown Blossoms In Garden Club Exhibit

The artistic arrangement of flowers for the dinner table and in an ornamental basket are among the classes under which members of the Birmingham Branch of the National Farm and Garden Association will exhibit at the annual flower show to be held at the Community House Monday.

The rules for the show provide that all flowers must be grown in the exhibitor's garden, that all exhibitors must furnish containers in all classes and that all entries must be made at the Community House between 9 and 11 A. M. Monday.

Other classifications include artistic arrangement of annuals only, the largest collection of annuals, with three of each variety; the mixed bouquet, and the largest collection of bulbs with three of each variety.

Classes in which single varieties may be entered include poppies, irises, peonies, roses, pansies, and other flowering shrubs and trees. The artistic arrangement of wild flowers is another class for entries, as are dish gardens and shadow boxes.
