DEFEAT ENDS NET SEASON

Baldwin Wins To Pontiac, 3 to 1, In 1931 Court-Finale

Baldwin High School's racket-wiebers ended a mediocre court season by dropping the final tilt of the year to the strong Pontiac High School tennis team in a contest played at Pontiac last Friday afternoon, 4 to 1.

Playton won the only match for Baldwin when he defeated Seelye 6-2, 12-10. Mills lost his singles match to Martinewier, Pontiac number one man, 6-3, 6-2. Whalen dropped his tie to Doris, 4-6, 6-3. In the doubles matches both Baldwin teams, Whalen and Brien and Payton and Morrow, lost in straight sets.

During the season, Baldwin's tennis scored three victories out of eight contests, winning from Perdue Royal Oak, and River Rouge. This year is the first that William Maywood has coached the team, and a distinct improvement

Rallying in the fifth and sixth innings to count three runs in each frame, the junior class of Baldwin High School annexed another championship to its list by beating the sophomore nine, 11 to 10 in the final game of the Baldwin inter-class softball league played Monday afternoon.

The juniors trailed the fast starting sophomores until the fifth inning, when Annette, flashy junior third-sacker, started a three run outburst by hitting a home run over the left field fence. After McClelland struck out, Canever walked and E. Rocheleau singled him to third. Canever scored on a wild peg and Rocheleau followed him over the platter on Davis' infield out.

With two men down in the first inning, Wedge, soph hurler, reached first on an error, and a base on balls and two singles followed to give the sophs a lead of three. However, the juniors tied up the score with three runs on a trio of singles and a double in the last half of the second inning.

FAVOR MAPLES TO COP MEET

Baldwin Expected To Repeat In 3rd Annual Junior High Track Contest

The third annual championship track and field meet at Birmingham Junior High Schools will be held at Pierce field tomorrow afternoon. The meet begins at 3 o'clock.

Baldwin Junior High School's team is expected to cop the meet, having won the contest for the last two years. A victory tomorrow will give Baldwin permanent possession of its trophy annually awarded to the winning team. Adams Junior High School will be the runner-up for second place with Barnum with the first named school having a slight edge for third place.

Girls' and boys' teams from each school will compete. More than 100 athletes are entered in the meet. Each division, the girls' and the boys', will be scored separately and the winner in each will be given 15 points toward the Birmingham Junior High School activity championship cup.

According to E. T. Engel, athletic director in the village schools, several records are expected to be broken in the boys' contests. Records now on the books were made in 1929 and there is every possibility that at least half of those will be bettered in tomorrow's meet.

Lightweight division: 75-yard dash—10.7, Lloyd Grunwald. 50-yard hurdles—12.1, Fred Schwarze. Shot put—29 feet 1 inch, D. McDonough. Discus—34 feet 2 inches, Floyd Groves. Running broad jump—15 feet 3 inches, McDonough. High jump—4 feet 3 inches, McDonough.

Franklyn Whitney, track coach, will be starter and referee. Clarence Vliet, Melvin G. Hart, Clarence Cooke, and Howard D. Crull will act as judges and timers of all running events. William Maywood and Charles Hubbard will have charge of the weight events. The pole vault, high jump and the broad jump will be supervised by Alfred Schalm and Merlyn Smiley.

The girls' events will be in charge of Miss Jeanette Kriekard, Mrs. Frances Stephenson and Miss Miriam Brown, all of whom are physical education directors in the junior high schools.
