LAND COURT NEWS

Royal Oak and Detroit officials were guests Thursday of John T. Millen, director of the Detroit Zoological park, at the formal dedication of the new miniature railroad which was placed in operation at the park opening.

The railroad boasts two trains pulled by two miniature locomotives and will enable visitors to the park to ride instead of walk from one exhibit to another. The park opened to the public Thursday morning and will remain open until late in the fall.

PLEASANT RIDGE village tax rate for the ensuing year will be \$16.24 per thousand dollars assessed valuation—a reduction of 52 cents from last year's rate. The city commission adopted a budget totaling \$92,605.27, which \$23,000 is to be raised by taxation. The budget includes an allowance for delinquent taxes and for increased cost of fire protection.

Valuation last year was \$4,474,235 and is expected to be \$4,406,183 this year. A decrease of \$52,000 in personal property and an increase of \$74,000 in real estate resulted in the new figure, which is to be approved by the board of review.

A contract with Royal Oak covering purchase of water from the North Woodward water system was signed by the mayor and clerk and now must have the approval of the Detroit water board.
