Celebrate Birthday Of Organization

Today, 250,000 Girl Scouts are celebrating the nineteenth birthday of the organization. Eleven girls were organized on March 12, 1912, in Savannah, Ga., by Juliette Lewis, as the first Girl Scout troop. Girl Scouts in 9,000 troops today will spruce up their meeting places, brush their uniforms, polish their shoes and join hands in a national birthday party.

From that first troop of eleven girls, called the "White Rose" patrol, has grown an organization which has reached out to more than one million girls during their "teen years."

The first camp, Lowlands, founded in 1913 in Savannah, has multiplied to 245 camps.

The first headquarters, one room in the Louisa Porter home in Savannah, moved to Washington D. C. and later to New York, where it now occupies two adjoining buildings.

The first training camp, at Lookout Mountain, near Rome, Ga., has developed into four national training schools and 12 national training centers.

The first uniform, a dark blue dress worn with a light blue tie, reminiscent of the English Girl Guide's, has been discarded for the "radio American" life green uniform, worn lower, not only in the United States, but in its territorial dependencies as well.

Juliette Lewis died in 1927, having accomplished her purpose and leaving behind her a great legacy realized. The movement she founded to give every girl an opportunity to develop the best within her, according to her personal bent, grows stronger day by day.
