Mr. and Mrs. Archie Gray are moving this week into the home belonging to Karl Tibbitts, on Maple street, Franklin.

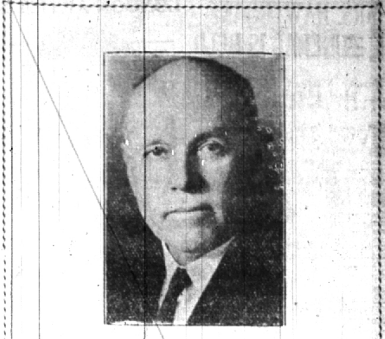
Washington-Lincoln Debate Results a Tie

BUILDING SHOWS SLIGHT DECLINE

Construction Permits \$9,600 Less Than Issued in February of Last Year, Report

Building activities in Birmingham during February were only \$9,600 less than for the same period last year, according to the regular monthly report of Donald C. Egbert, building inspector. Permits for two single residences, one commercial building and four miscellaneous constructions, totalling \$27,000 were issued. The two residences were valued at \$32,000, the commercial building at \$2,500 and the private garages, alterations, etc. at \$2,700. During January of this year, permits for buildings and alterations valued at \$38,200 were issued, while in January 1930, permits for buildings and alterations valued at \$53,800 were issued.

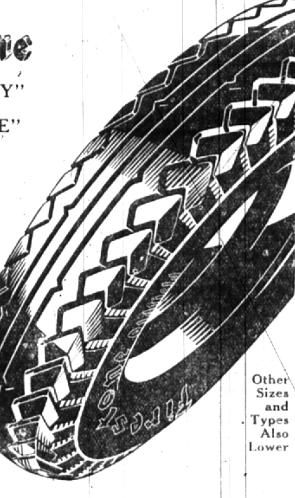
