

E. H. R. SETTLES TAX BILL HERE

Sells Rails, Wires For Junk Removal Work Begins

The Eastern Michigan Railway, owners of the abandoned electric suburban line between Detroit and Pontiac, Friday, paid to lock personal taxes owed to several villages and townships along the line and announced the sale of rails and wires to a Detroit scrap iron dealer.

Fender wires along the entire line were taken down Saturday, and removal of rails was begun on Woodward avenue south of Pontiac. No indication was given as to when the work would be completed.

The rails in Birmingham between Oak and Lincoln streets, which are now imbedded in concrete, will be removed by the scrap dealer, officials of the railroad told Village Manager James W. Parry. The others will be left to be covered over at the village's expense.

Since the poles on which the railway's wires were strung through Birmingham are the property of the Detroit-Edison company, and are those on which

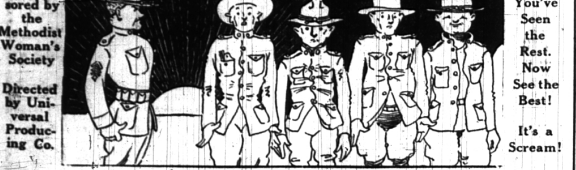

SENTENCE, DIES

Had Plead Guilty To Embroidery In Hazel Park School Scandal

Mrs. Lottie S. Tibbos, former member of the Hazel Park School Board, died in Pontiac General Hospital Tuesday night while waiting to be sentenced on a charge of embroidery in which she had pleaded guilty in connection with the \$3,500 graft centering around the erection of the \$500,000 Hazel Park High School building two years ago.

Mrs. Tibbos had signed a grand jury indictment along with John Parsons, inspector, appointed to supervise construction of the building. Frank J. Koukol, also a member of the School Board, was tried and found guilty of embezzlement by a grand jury which returned its verdict after deliberating an hour and a half in Oakland County Circuit Court.

All three were to be sentenced Saturday morning along with Floyd B. Babcock, former county clerk, and Pontiac postmaster, who was found guilty of embezzling \$1,050 belonging to the Oakland County Tuberculosis Hospital while acting as its business manager.

Nervous strain over the charges and forthcoming sentence was believed partly responsible for Mrs. Tibbos' death. Heart complications and an inward stroke were contributing causes.

Members of the Commission explained that the measure was passed because of the great number of dog complaints received by the police department, because of the damage done to gardens by roaming dogs, and because of the danger to children from vicious dogs which may be infected with rabies.

In reply to the first reason, Mr. Welley claimed that in his opinion it is the duty of the police as public servants, to take care of dog complaints of property owners, and that the ordinance as it now stands is an imposition on the tax payer rather than on the dog owner.

Continuing in answer to the second reason, he said: "To both 750 to 1000 property owners in this town because somebody's garden is trampled."

"He claims there are about 1000 dog owners in the village who are out of sympathy with the ordinance and that the ordinance as it now stands is an imposition on the tax payer rather than on the dog owner."

Mr. Schatz, the only private citizen to speak favorably of the measure, followed Mrs. Hart.

Commendable Village "I think enough of my dog to provide a place for him and keep him confined within it," he said. "I commend the village on having done nothing that it should have done five years ago."

A long discussion followed over the possibility of establishing machinery in the village for licensing only those dogs which have been inoculated against disease, but a suggestion received no definite sanction from the Commission in view of the fact that dog licenses are a county function and special village machinery for the purpose would raise difficult problems.

Village Manager James W. Parry reviewed the reasons for which he felt the ordinance was deemed necessary, claimed that dogs, if left untied, roam the streets with their owners in full view, and said that "it is fatiguing to assume that a dog must be free to roam the whole neighborhood."

Scores Police Mr. Parry also referred to the element of terrorism caused by allowing freedom to dogs which may be infected with rabies. His words on this subject were followed immediately by a reference made by Mr. Dweilley to a recent incident in which a dog was shot by police before scores of young students at Adams School.

"Which terrifies most," Mr. Dweilley said, "is a couple of innocent dogs or the police coming up to an act of brutality like that."

"I think you're coming pretty close to trampling on personal liberty with an ordinance of that nature," he added.

Mention was also made of another recent incident, confirmed at the meeting by Chief of Police John F. Hackett, regarding a Birmingham youth who was sent to
