## EIGHT QUALIFY FOR BIG MEET

Baldwin Track Team Finishes Fifth in Class B Regional Program

Placing eight men in the finals of the annual regional (class B) track meet held at Ypsilanti last Saturday, Baldwin High School's cinder shoe has qualified these athletes to enter the state finals to be held at Lansing tomorrow and Saturday. Birmingham took fifth place in the regional meet with Dearborn winning the championship in class B.

Monroe took the class A honors. Last year Monroe was only a class B school, but presenting a well-balanced team they easily won in the higher class, scoring 51 points to beat out Pontiac by 15 counters. Sixteen meet records were broken during the day. St. Clair won class C and South Lake was returned the winner in class D.

## PONTIAC TOPS LOCAL NINE

Cranbrook Bows in Slugfest, 18 to 12; Two Teams Pound 30 Hits  
After working up to a 5 to 2 lead in the first two innings, Cranbrook's baseball nine suffered in the third and lost its second game of the season to Pontiac High School at the latter's field last Monday, 18 to 12. The game was characterized by hard hitting on both sides, each team pounding out 18 hits.

Cranbrook opened strong with two hits and a run in the first inning at the same time holding Pontiac down to the same number of tallies with less hits to their credit. In the second frame, the Blue and Gray hit Farlow, Pontiac hurler for four safeties, which brought in as many runs. A homer by Otis was the feature of this inning and the high point of Cranbrook's scoring.

When the third chapter opened with Pontiac behind, 5 to 2, the home team suddenly found Lefebvre, Cranbrook hurler, and delivered seven safe hits with eight runs to force him out of the box. Pontiac hit at will, going almost twice around the batting order, and making three two-base hits among the seven. In the same inning, Cranbrook failed to put a man on base.

## CRANBROOK IN TRACK DEFEAT

Cleveland University School Tramples Blue And Gray, 79 to 43

Bowing to all-round superiority on the part of their visitors, Cranbrook's track team lost to Cleveland University School last Saturday on the Blue and Gray field by a score of 79 to 43. Although Cranbrook was able to take only four out of 14 first places, several new meet records were set in this meet, and Coach Thompson feels far from dissatisfied with the showing made by his relatively inexperienced men.

Making their best bid in the track events, Cleveland took many places in both the dashes and distance races. Cranbrook felt sorely in the absence of Rose and Rauch, star sprinters who were out with minor injuries, and was able to take only third in the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

In the 440-yard run, Raymond, taking second place to Frawley of Cleveland, made a new school record of 54.4 seconds, while Garyan did the same in the 800, although he was defeated by both Frawley and Wagner of the visiting team.

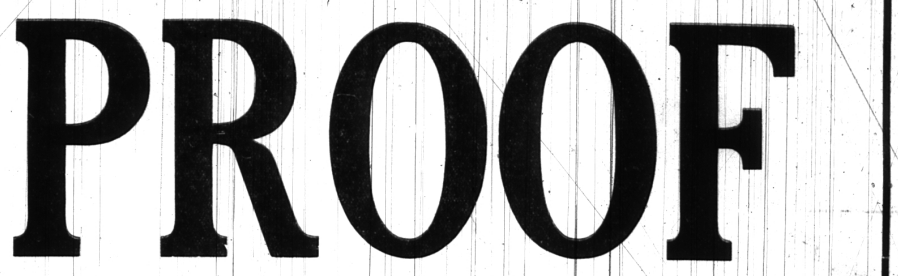
## Sons Plan Annual Entertainment For Fathers At Cranbrook Saturday
