Peace Resolution Passed By House

A partial victory was won by the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom Tuesday when the State House of Representatives passed the resolution introduced by the league, headed by Mrs. George Hanley of Fond du Lac, chairman of the Oakland County branch.

The resolution sponsored by the league asked the legislature to memorialize the President Hoover to send delegates pledged to the reduction of armaments to the International Disarmament Conference in February, 1932.

The resolution asks "That this meeting urge the President to strengthen the means of pacific settlement and to instruct our delegates to the International Disarmament Conference not only to cooperate with every effort looking to disarmament, but to lead the way toward securing peace."
