STATE ROLLS READY FOR '31

Saunders Expects Re-Assessment of County To Be Completed This Year

Information received by The Eccentric last week from Edwin F. Saunders, chairman of the State Tax Commission at Lansing, indicates that the assessment now being taken by the state in Oakland County will be completed in time to place the figures on the rolls for the state and county taxes of 1931.

The information was requested of Mr. Saunders in answer to conflicting reports from various sources as to whether or not the assessment could be completed in time for the figures to be used as a basis for this year's taxes.

In a letter to The Eccentric, Mr. Saunders, although not positive that this can be done, stated in speaking for the commission that "we expect" to have the work completed before the rolls are drawn up.

Mr. Saunders' letter also explains that Oakland County is the only county being re-assessed by the state in full this year, although several scattered townships in other counties throughout the state are being re-assessed.

The letter follows, in part: "The Tax Commission is at the present time engaged in the re-assessing of Oakland County, and we expect it will be completed in time to hold our reviews and place our figures on the rolls for the state and county taxes of 1931.

"At the present time our force is all concentrated in Oakland County, so that we are not re-assessing any other county, but as soon as Oakland County is finished we expect to take on another.

"In the meantime, however, we have been assessing several townships in other counties scattered throughout the state.

Vitalle Gets One To Five Years For Auto Death Crash

John Vitalle, Flint, who was convicted in Oakland County Circuit Court of criminal homicide in connection with an automobile accident on Telegraph road last winter in which three persons were killed, was sentenced to serve from one to five years in Michigan State Prison by Judge Glenn C. Gillespie Monday morning.

Recommendation by the court that the minimum term be served accompanied pronouncement of the sentence. Vitalle was also directed to pay the expenses of the accident, amounting to about \$800.

Vitalle was the driver of the machine which crashed into another car driven by Thomas Sanford, Orchard Lake, according to Telegraph road last winter, killing Sanford's two children and fatally injuring their mother, Mrs. Leah Govin. Sanford was badly injured in the crash.

Two Local Women Injured As Cars Collide Head-On

Mrs. Bessie Baker, 267 Ruffner street, and Mrs. Emma Ballus, 707 Harmon street, were slightly injured in an automobile accident at the corner of Woodward avenue and Thirteenth Mile road Thursday afternoon.

The crash occurred when a car driven by Mrs. Baker met head-on with another machine driven by Frank Sutherland, 19 years old, of 415 East Fifth street, Royal Oak. Mrs. Baker was driving south while Sutherland was traveling north.

Mrs. Baker sustained a sprained ankle and bruises, and Mrs. Ballus received facial cuts and minor bruises. Both women were removed to their homes.

Ernest Evelyn, 17 years old, Box 598, R. 17, 6, who was riding with Sutherland at the time of the crash, suffered cuts and bruises and the loss of several teeth.

According to Bloomfield Hills police, in front of whose abode in the village hall the stirring scene of the impromptu show was enacted, the cows were tied to the truck and so were unable to run away, but the calf galloped for several yards down Woodward avenue before it was finally halted, without benefit of lasso, by George Tegges who rushed to the capture from his plumbing shop in the Fox and Hoard Inn building across the street.

The driver of the truck, a farmer from the northern part of the county, told police his truck overturned because he was unable to stop for a red light and swerved too quickly off Woodward onto Long Lake road. Neither the driver nor any of the cattle were injured.




