OPENS MOVIE NEWS SERVICE

Local Group Plans Film Program for Home Picture Machine Owners

A news reel service for owners of home motion picture machines, said to be the first of its kind ever established in America, has been opened in Birmingham under the direction and supervision of Mort Walton of the firm of Ashton and Walton, aerial photographers.

Known as the American Monthly News, the service is designed to furnish its subscribers with a 400-foot reel of film every month, picturing important news happenings of universal interest.

Pictures for the service will be taken, the films developed, edited and titled under the supervision of an official board composed of Mr. Walton, W. D. Knox and David Martindale.

In the beginning, the photographs will be confined more or less to the Detroit area, but plans are to extend the service until it will eventually include a staff of free lance photographers in all sections of the country who will send their pictures to Birmingham to be included in the regular monthly reels.

Subjects for the films will include, according to Mr. Walton, flashes of celebrities during important occasions, spectacular fires, races, train, ship or other accidents, catastrophes, parades, athletic contests and other events of outstanding importance.

Events which have already been photographed by the service include the Herkley theater explosion a few weeks ago, motorcycle

races at Pontiac and various happenings in this part of the state. Among the important future events which Mr. Walton intends to photograph are the national auto races at Indianapolis Memorial Day and the national air races at Cleveland late in the summer.

The reels will be sent out on subscriptions to owners of home motion picture machines in the United States or Canada. Occasional reels desired by non-subscribers will be obtainable by a special rental fee. Each reel will be 400 feet long, requiring about 11 minutes for showing.

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From A WOMAN'S ANGLE

And now, thanks to a Johns Hopkins University expert, we know at last what "mother love" is.

The poets, psychologists and biologists who have previously explained mother love according to their various lights, are all wrong, says our new expert.

Mother love is a matter of chemistry. Simplest thing in the world! It is merely manganese.

Add manganese to your diet, and you will be possessed of mother love. Eliminate manganese, and you will probably bundle up the baby and leave it on a doorstep. Because, we are warned by the expert, "mother love is due to manganese in food and might vanish if that element were eliminated."

Why not have a "More Manganese for Mothers' Week?"

As long as we are on the subjects of mothers and diets, we are reminded of Chicago's recent discovery.

It occurred to Miss Edith Abbott, dean of the graduate school of social service administration of the University of Chicago, recently, that one reason for the failure of modern costly educational methods to register in the minds of some children was because of their very empty "tummies."

It was Miss Abbott who pointed out that the slow backward child who fails to respond to class room methods, is usually the under-nourished child. In the present time of unemployment, it has been found that 20 percent of the children were forced to go to school in Chicago either without meals or with very scanty ones.

Chicago has come to the rescue. A fund of \$21,000 has been raised to establish a free food department in public schools, pending the necessary legislation to make it permanent. Free lunches will now be furnished to needy children.

Through Miss Abbott's discovery any mother may find a problem solved. We are sometimes too prone to attribute misbehavior, fretfulness, listlessness and other symptoms in children, to wrong nervous or mental reactions.

When, like Chicago educators, we may be overlooking the lunch box. Diet is indeed a key through which, not only health, but behavior can be regulated.
