

### WOMEN, MAN HURT IN CRASH

#### Cars Hit Head-On At Woodward-Oak Intersection

Two women and a man were badly, though not seriously injured last Thursday afternoon when cars in which they were riding collided head-on near the Woodward-avenue-Oak street intersection.

Mrs. E. E. Hey, 18 years old, of 1108 La Salle street, Pontiac, the driver of one of the cars, suffered cuts about the head and face, and her mother, Mrs. Pearl Piersons, 40 years old, sustained a broken left leg and severe lacerations about the head.

Edward Leonard, 23 years old, of 916 Haynes street, Birmingham, was also cut about the face.

The injured were treated by Dr. C. E. Lawler and removed to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac.

### TAX DELINQUENCY PROBLEM STUDIED

#### Village Hopes Survey Will Lead To Speedier Collections

Village Assessor Albert W. Noonan is at work today under the Commission's instructions to make a thorough study of the tax delinquency situation in the village with a view to discovering what action can be taken, if any, to increase the rate of collections.

According to James W. Parry, village manager, the study will include a tabulation of overlapping delinquencies and a listing of the areas most involved. If the survey makes the plan appear feasible, he said, the village may attempt to collect delinquent taxes on the installment system.

The study is designed, as much as anything else, as a service to delinquent realtors and subdivision owners who are re-financing and who may soon find themselves unable to pay their back taxes," Mr. Parry said. "We feel that if we are in a position to give them complete information on their delinquency problems, we will stand a better chance of receiving earlier collections."

### History of The Armistice

(Continued from Page 1, Part 2) address to the Congress of the United States on the 8th of January last—and that the subject in entering into discussions would be only to agree with the practical details and their application.

"The President feels bound to regard to the suggestion of an armistice that he does not feel at liberty to propose the cessation of arms to the Government with which the Government of the United States is associated against the Central Powers, so long as the arms of those Powers are upon their soil.

"The good faith of any discussion would manifestly depend upon the consent of the Central Powers, immediately to withdraw their forces everywhere from the invaded territory.

"The President also feels that he is justified in asking whether the Imperial Government is speaking merely for the constituted authorities of the Empire or whether it speaks in the name of the German people.

"The Chancellor is supported in all his actions by the will of this majority and speaks in the name of the German Government and the German people."

### October Building Total Is \$50,000

Five permits for buildings and additions representing a total valuation of \$50,100 were issued here in October according to the monthly report of Donald C. Egbert, building inspector.
