

What Boy Scout officials believe will be the most significant program in the history of scouting in Birmingham is planned for the night of Jan. 29 at the Community House when the combination father-son and mother-son banquet and Court of Honor will be accompanied by several entertainment features.

Among the speakers will be Douglas Jamieson, former Boy Scout commissioner in Detroit; Henry White, present commissioner, and others to be announced later.

Music will be furnished by a Negro octette and community singing will be led by Foster Jones, Detroit scout leader.

The largest number of Eagle scouts ever assembled in Birmingham is expected to be present.

Among the awards to be presented in connection with the Court of Honor will be the advancement cup awarded semi-annually to the troop showing the most progress in the preceding six months; and the announcement of the winner of the "outstanding scout" honor, whose name is inscribed annually on a wall plaque hanging in the Community House.

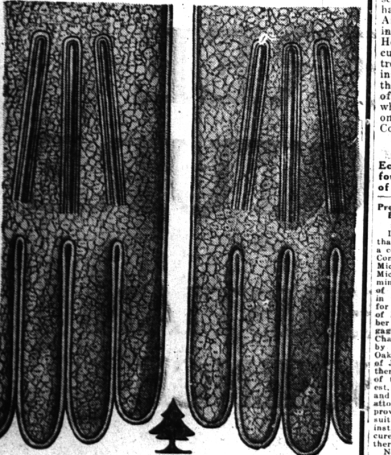


