**HANLEY RIES HELPS MONDAY**

Former Wayne Probate Judge, Bloomfield Resident, Dies After Stroke

His wife, Mrs. Violet E. Hanley, former state women's golf champion, was at his side when the end came, having driven most of the night from Buffalo where she was attending the national women's golf tournament, arriving at the hospital shortly before 4 A. M.

Mr. Hanley, who was 50 years old, was born in Detroit and received his education at Central High School and the University of Michigan, excelling in scholarship, oratory and debate.

On his graduation from the university and his admittance to the bar in 1914, he began the practice of law in Detroit, and three years later was appointed assistant county prosecutor under George F. Robinson.

He served in the prosecutor's office two years, after which he became a member of the firm of Gullion, Cosgrain and Hanley. It was in 1913 that Mr. Hanley was appointed to the probate bench by the late Gov. Woodbridge N. Ferris, to fill an unexpired term of two years.

Since 1915 he had been associated with the law firm of Lightner, Oxtoby, Hanley and Crawford, and was recognized as one of Detroit's most successful trial lawyers. He was a member of the State Board of Corrections and national bar associations, he served as president of the Detroit association in 1921-22.

He was married to Violet E. Keenan of Detroit in 1912. There are two children, Helen Hope, 16, and Elaine Elizabeth, 12. He was a member of the Detroit Council Knights, the Columbian Detroit Athletic Club, Oakland Hills Country Club, Bloomfield Hills Country Club and Grand Pointe Yacht Club. He was a loyal Democrat in his political affiliations.

"I don't believe any convention has ever been put over any better than Detroit did this one," he said. "Everything was run to the queen's taste."
