

CHURCH WILL OPEN EVENING SERVICES

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ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING DISTRICT NO. 6

The Annual School meeting of District No. 6, Township of Troy, Oakland County, Mich., was held at the school house at Big Beaver July 13, 1931, at 8 P. M.

Meeting was called to order by the President Norman C. Orr. Members present were Orr, Schroeder, Eesman, Miller and Howlett.

Minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

Next order of business was the reading of the Secretary's and Treasurer's reports which were accepted as read.

Motion made by Lentzen, supported by Mrs. Maddock that the Board of Education see about re-financing 1930 delinquent taxes on a 5 to 10 year bond, to be reported at a Special Meeting. Motion Carried.

Motion made by Tracey, supported by O'Connor that the salaries of the officers of the Board of Education remain the same. Motion Carried.

Next order of business was the election of one officer. Mrs. Tracey was appointed Clerk, Mr. Eesman and Mr. Simpson were appointed Tellers. Mr. Orr and Mr. Penny were nominated. There were 79 ballots cast, Mr. Orr receiving 40 votes, and Penny 39, thereby electing Mr. Orr for three years.

Motion made by Simpson supported by O'Connor that the meeting be adjourned until Aug. 10, 1931 when the Board of Education will give final report on bond issue. Motion Carried.



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
