Motion made by Buck and supported by Correll that the following resolution be adopted:
Whereas the question of establishment of the River Rouge by sewage from tributary area, namely, Bloodfield Township and the village of Birmingham and Bloodfield Hills has been recognized by the local authorities and the Michigan Department of Health; and Whereas the County Drain Commission has made a thorough study of the River Rouge sewage treatment problem and has submitted a complete report outlining a method of collection and treatment of sewage for the River Rouge drainage district, which report is available to the Michigan Department of Health, and which plan requires it is necessary to construct a sewage tank, and which makes it necessary to treat the sewage in several parts of the drainage district; and Whereas the Township Engineer commends a plan which will result in a sewage treatment plant and which offers a solution to this problem for the River Rouge; Therefore be it resolved that the Township Board approve and ratify the report for the collection and treatment of sewage from the River Rouge by sewage from the River Rouge drainage district tributary to the River Rouge as submitted by the County Drain Commission; together with the plan containing therefor necessary and allowing costs; and that the Township Board recommend that the project may be authorized by the Township Board on the date when financial conditions permit; and that the Township Board be authorized to sign a petition for the purpose of securing the necessary legislation in Bloodfield Township.
