COUNTY CHILDREN BENEFIT BY FUND

Cousins' Program For Dental Hygiene Reaches 6,000 Students Since 1929

The Children's Fund of Michigan, established by Senator James Cousins in the winter of 1929, has extended in Oakland County an educational and dental hygiene program to about 6,000 school children, according to a report made to the Board of Supervisors recently by Dr. Floyd H. DeCamp of Pontiac, the Fund's dental director in this county.

In Oakland County, the report showed, the Fund's program has been concentrated in small community and rural school districts and consisted principally of talks to students and Parent-Teacher Association inspection of the teeth of every student in the schools covered and corrective work gratis for the children and poor parents.

Children unable to pay for the necessary dental work are sent to a dental clinic maintained by the Fund at Keego Harbor, while the others are referred to their family dentists.

Up to the beginning of this fall's term, 55 schools in the county had been especially under the Fund's program, and 3,800 children had been examined. Of these, 1,800 had received corrective work in the Fund's clinic.

This year, the program is aimed to cover almost exclusively rural schools. Dr. DeCamp's report shows that in 1930-31, 1,089 have been inspected and 1,089 dental correctives.

With a view to making its program one of prevention rather than cure, the Fund's activities are confined to students in the primary grades, and record cards of each child's dental condition are filled out to correspond with the progress in school.

Dr. DeCamp thanked the aid he had received from county health officials and especially the County Health Department for the co-operation given him in working out the Fund's program in this county.

Besides its school work, the Fund maintains children's Clinics at the Juvenile Home and St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac.
