GOLF CLUB TITLE GOES TO HANWAY
Scores Close Victory At Birmingham; Brinke Wins At Oakland

A birdie four on the 36th hole gave Bill Hanway, University of Michigan student, the championship of the Birmingham Golf Club in a thrilling victory over Harold C. Meher in the final round Sunday, one up.

Many Birmingham citizens who were opposed to changing to the city form of government are wondering if several additional supervisors could not save them undue increases in tax assessments when the County Board of Equalization meets each year. As it now is, Birmingham is represented on the County Board by the Township Supervisor, with only one vote.

If it were a city it probably would have three supervisors, in other words, the case now stands, Bloomfield Township has taxation without equitable representation.
