CRASH INJURIES FATAL TO DRIVER

Detroit Dies After Collision On Southfield Road, Inquest

Injuries suffered in an automobile crash early Wednesday morning of last week at the corner of Southfield and Thirteenth Wile roads proved fatal to noon last Thursday to Roland E. Matteson, 45 years old, of 1464 Chandler avenue, Detroit.

Matteson was the driver of a car which collided with another driven by William C. Van Horn, 49 years old, of Orchard Lake. Van Horn escaped injury, but both cars were badly wrecked and Matteson received lacerations of the head, several fractured ribs, a fractured collar bone and internal injuries. He died in St. Joseph Hospital, Pontiac.

There will probably be no inquest according to Coroner G. Dewey Kimball.

VAUGHAN REPORTS ON POOR RELIEF

Township Gives Aid To 149 Men In 1931, Supervisor Says

A total of 149 men have received assistance in the way of grocery orders and other aid, and have given their services to the extent of 41,079 hours of labor from Nov. 1, 1930, to Sept. 1, 1931, according to a tabulation of welfare work done through Bloomfield Township, prepared by Supervisor Ferry A. Vaughan.

Money paid during the period totaled \$16,431.60, which does not include all the money spent by the township for welfare work. Up to recently this labor had been employed at 40 cents an hour. The rate has now been lowered to 35 cents.

A total of 28,379 hours of work has been done by out-of-town men on township roads, cutting weeds and mowing the grass in the village along the River Rouge, and working on water and sewer main projects. Extra janitor work in the Municipal Building, the library, schools and Y. M. C. A. has been done by 28 men for a total of 6,997 hours.

BURNED IN EXPLOSION

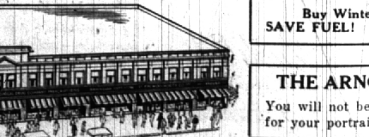
