FEEL FREE TO CONFESS ROBBERY

Man, Three Youths Await Sentence On Charge Of Stealing Tools

A man and three youths are in the hands of Oakland County authorities today awaiting sentence on a breaking and entering charge for which they were arrested less than 48 hours after committing the offense.

They are Willis Colwell, 22 years old, 708 Ruffner street, Birmingham; Chester Gordon, 33 E. North Reese, 19 and Robert Colwell, 15, all of East-way drive, Fontana.

The theft was reported early last Thursday morning. Four suspects were arrested and the stolen goods were recovered in Pontiac Friday night by Sergeant Doyle Service and Detective MacGregor of the Birmingham police department.

Gordon and Robert Colwell pleaded guilty to Judge Arthur J. Tugger Saturday afternoon. Reese and Willis Colwell denied the charge, but Monday offered to change their plea to guilty.

Lloyd Calvin, 21 years old, of Mt. Clemens street, Pontiac, who was arrested with the others, admitted that his automobile had been borrowed by the trio the night of the break-in, but was released after he had convinced police he was ignorant of the purpose for which it was to be used.

Robert Colwell was committed to the County Detention home and the other three to the county jail to await sentence.

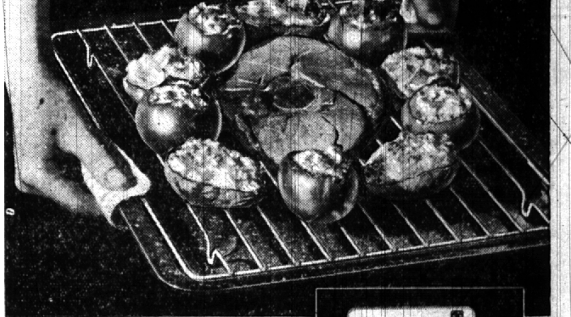
