

**Alarm Clock's Vacation Scheduled To End Tuesday As Schools Re-open**

Vacation for the alarm clock and the school bell will be over Tuesday. The alarm clock, which unobtrusively ticked away the dreary vacation hours, will again be on duty to see that Birmingham school children are "early to school" instead of "lazing along as they should be" on the 10 o'clock school bell.

According to Superintendent Clarence V. Villet, Birmingham schools are all prepared for the ringing of the school bell next Tuesday. Repairs have been at hand as have re-arranging arrangements, and all is now ready to welcome the 2,400 pupils who are expected to enroll.

Aside from the dropping of 14 teachers from the faculty for the sake of economy, few changes in the schools or in the courses have been made. The one outstanding change is the shortening of the school calendar to 9 1/2 months from 10 as formerly, also necessitated by the rules of economy under which the Board of Education is now functioning.
