## Historical Playlet Is Presented By Literary Club As Welfare Benefit

Appropos of the Washington Bicentennial was the theme of the one-act play, "A Dish of China Tea," by Elizabeth H. Neff, presented by the cast from the Women's Literary Club at the Community House Tuesday afternoon.

The plot of the play centers around the clandestine efforts of Janette Wynne to aid the cause of the colonies and General Washington in spite of the British sympathies of her parents, Judge and Mrs. Annalynne Wynne.

At the curtain rose, Mrs. Fred S. Ross, in the role of Mrs. Wynne, a charming hostess of Revolutionary times, was engaged in entertaining a group of friends, also British in sympathy, at a tea party.

To show her defiance of the Colonial Government, Mrs. Wynne served "China Tea," forbidden among the patriots since the Boston Tea Party, which she had hidden during the seven years' war. The time is October 1781, at the close of the Revolution.

Honor guest in this select little group is Lady Augusta Clive, recently returned from England, a part graciously played by Mrs. R. W. Brecker. Others at the tea were Mrs. Fred G. Crawford in the role of the Hon. Clarissa Courtney; Mrs. G. A. Bowles as Mrs. Cornelia Throckmorton; Mrs. J. W. Tarry as Mrs. Cynthia Lawrence; Mrs. G. W. Jones as Janette, the rebel daughter of the hostess; and Mrs. Leland Banya as an English nobleman, young relative of Mrs. Wynne.

The tea party, given by a staunch British sympathizer in the confidence of victory, closes with a toast with the forbidden tea to General Washington by the brave patriots who are engaged in extracting secrets regarding British movements from her British fiancé and passing them on to Washington through Roger Smallwood, an American soldier with whom she is really in love, have helped to bring about victory.

The play was cleverly presented under the direction of Mrs. Potter. Mrs. Hendrick Brause was in charge of the ticket sale, and the properties committee included Mrs. Charles Kinison and Mrs. Francis C. Bagby.

Preceding the play, Mrs. H. H. Gardiner, in the play, Mrs. S. H. characteristic of colonial days in costume, accompanied by Mrs. Howard.

At the close of the play a solo duet was danced by Mrs. Tynone (gay), accompanied by Mrs. Earl G. Potter.

Following the program, Mrs. C. A. Bowles and Mrs. Fred S. Ross poured tea and members of the cast assisted in serving the 250 members of the audience at an informal social hour.
