Corruption In Cities Seen As Threat To Civilization
Cincinnati Mayor Would Rip National Party Shields From Municipal Governments

(Corrupt Wilson was born in Cincinnati, O., Nov. 10, 1876. He was a student of Princeton one year, and is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati. He was dramatic editor of the Cincinnati Post from 1908 to 1910, and associate editor of the Cincinnati Times-Star from 1913 to 1920. He was president of the Cincinnati Association from 1924 to 1925, and president of the Foreign Policy Association. He now is mayor of Cincinnati, which has the largest municipal form of government—the mayor being an ex-officio officer.)

OUR AMERICAN civilization cannot much longer stand the waste and corruption of municipal government administered by local political organizations. Behind the party shield things are done that no state or national party organization could do. There is no plank in the platform of either great political party that "points to with pride" the city form of government in public contracts, to the devising of specifications so that favored corporations or individuals shall receive contracts, to the performance of such contracts so that private profits shall be out of the expense of the public treasury, to administration of laws and ordinances for the benefit of the privileged, to the connivance of the police with racketeering.

These offenses against common honesty are supposed to be prohibited by our moral instincts, and common honesty is commonly ignored and its breach rather than its observance accepted as a matter of course in some of our great cities.

Waste and corruption are regarded as the price we must pay for our local adherence to national party ideals, whatever that may mean. Some local dealers disparage their espousal of the protective tariff, which to them really means for the profit they collect as protection to vice.

But there is no difference between a Republican boss and a Democratic boss. They are both after the same thing in the same way.

The most truly non-partisan thing in our politics is corruption and waste in municipal government. Move the Philadelphia demonstration on Belle Isle Sunday in protest against Communism, which will be celebrated the same day with the annual May Day observances.

Boy Scouts will have a prominent part in the Legion demonstration, and on 6 o'clock Sunday evening, Lloyd L. Stanley, a member of the local post and state chairman of the Legion's Boy Scout activities, is scheduled to give a radio address over station WXYZ, and on National Boys' Week, May 1 to 7.

RITE HELD HERE FOR M. F. FOWLER
Funeral services were held from Holy Name Church Monday morning for Melville Frederick Fowler, 31 years old, 59 Monroe street, Pontiac, who was instantly killed early last Thursday night in an automobile accident near Clyde. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Fowler, 684 Pierce street, and was an electrician by trade. Also surviving are the widow, Mrs. Louise Speer Fowler, two brothers, Bernard and Alphonso, and one sister, Angela, all of Birmingham.

M. Fowler met his death when the car he was driving, apparently at a high rate of speed, left the highway and catapulted over concrete abutment on White Lake road three miles east of the city.

The services were at 9 A. M. Monday, with burial in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.
