**Take Early Lead In Interclass Tourney; Juniors Are Second**

The Baldwin High School seniors jumped to an early lead this week in the intramural baseball standings, administering defeats to all three opposing teams. The sophomores took second place with two victories and one defeat. The juniors have won but one game, while the outlaws have dropped three straight.
