Admits Guilt in Light Bulb Fraud

Pontiac, Miss. Fined \$25 For Making Detroit Edison Company

Ors D. Van Oeckart, 27 years old, 324 North Oak avenue, Pontiac, was fined \$25 Thursday when he pleaded guilty before Justice Floyd S. Buck to a charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses.

Van Oeckart was accused of obtaining a quantity of new electric light bulbs from the Detroit Edison Company in exchange for old ones by representing himself as an important patron of the company and qualifying for its exchange service.

He was arrested here last month when he exchanged some bulbs at the Birmingham office of the company, and officials became suspicious of his actions. Several cartons of bulbs were found in his rooms in Pontiac, and he was said to have worked his racket in Detroit Edison offices in Pontiac, Rochester and other places as well as in Birmingham.
