SCHOOL CALENDAR GIVEN FOR 1932-33

Board Of Education Announces Dates On New 36-Week Schedule

The 1932-33 public school calendar, subject to revision, was announced at the meeting of the Board of Education last week. This was the second revision of the calendar made since the adoption of the new 36-week school year.

The calendar is as follows:

1932

Sep. 19, Monday—First semester begins.

Oct. 14-15, Friday and Saturday—M. E. A. convention, Ann Arbor, No School.

Oct. 25, Thursday and Friday—Thanksgiving holidays begin.

Dec. 23—Christmas holidays begin.

1933

Jan. 4—School resumes.

Jan. 26, Thursday—Mid year commencement.

Jan. 27, Friday—First semester ends.

Jan. 30, Monday—Second semester begins.

March 31—Spring holidays begin.

June 10—School resumes.

June 9, Friday—Second semester ends.

The Board also set the age entrance requirements to kindergarten as follows:

A child may enter kindergarten the first semester who is three years and six months old as of the preceding July 1.

Children may not enter kindergarten after the first month of either semester except by transfer from another kindergarten, the Board ruled.

Bees Cause Second Automobile Accident

Bees caused the second automobile accident within a week near Birmingham Friday when a car driven by Arthur Philion, of Twin Beach, Mich., was damaged, and Philion was injured, at the corner of Woodward and North-Western highway.

Philion, an employee of the Ford Motor company at River Rouge, attempted to remove a swarm of bees while into the car and doing so crashed into the rear of a parked car. He suffered serious lacerations about the face and minor elbow and leg muscle cuts. Philion complained of injuries in the chest.

He was treated by Dr. C. P. Lawler and removed to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, where he was admitted to the hospital Saturday.



The Federal Reserve System has failed in its protection of individual banking institutions, it charged by T. H. Millington, of Squirrel road, a student of tanks and banking, in a talk given before the Economic Club at its weekly meeting at the Community House yesterday.

Mr. Millington, in criticizing the policy of the Federal Reserve, which he charges has misdirected it's main purpose to the principles of its founders, suggested a national guaranty bank to insure the safety of all commercial banks.

The proposed National Guaranty Bank would have funds from banks of all the country, and the interest on the fund would be administered by the Federal government. Its governing board would act with the National Security Commission to examine all securities and pass on their purchase by any of the country's banks.

SENTENCE YOUTH WHO FLED POLICE

Calumet Boy Who Leaped From Police Station Window Gets Term In Marquette

George Bernick, the 18-year-old Calumet, Mich., youth who made a spectacular escape from Bloomfield Hills police station by jumping from the sequestered window of the Hills police station, has been given a prison sentence in the State Prison at Marquette.

Chief William P. Pfeifer of the Bloomfield Hills police department received this information from Frank J. Francis, sheriff of Marquette County, who said Bernick was sentenced to from five to 15 years, with a recommendation of seven and a half.

Bernick pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering and of stealing an automobile. It was on the latter count that he was sent to Calumet for trial. He had been taken by Hills officers for a traffic violation and was discovered to be operating a car stolen from a Calumet garage. Learning that he had relatives in Calumet, the Hills officers forwarded information on his arrest to police officers there and the youth's arrest followed.
