

# 32 BOYS PASS Y SWIM TESTS

## Junior Campers Cited For Aquatic Proficiency At Loon Lake

Thirteen boys passed the junior beginner's test in swimming, 13 more passed the junior swimmer's test and six passed the junior life saving test at the Y. M. C. A. Boys' Camp on Loon Lake during the recent camping period. The camp, according to Robert D. Lyle, secretary of the Birmingham Y. M. C. A. and director of the camp.

The camp program gives each boy a 10-minute period every morning for either improving the swimming ability he has already acquired or receiving regular instruction for non-swimmers and beginners. Senior boys give a half hour in the afternoon for the same purpose.




