TOWNSHIP TAX RATE TO BE \$1.24

Board Approves \$37,517.00 Budget, Adds Road Repair Levy

Bloomfield Township's 1932-33 budget calling for a general tax levy of \$37,517.00 was officially approved by the Township Board Monday, but only after a special assessment levy of 50 cents per thousand for the road repair fund had been added to the original proposal.

The Board also inserted a tax of 76 cents per thousand for poor relief in the township for the three months beginning Jan. 1 when the welfare problem is to be turned back to individual township and cities. Based on an anticipated collection of \$3,132 per cent of the total levy, this rate is expected to raise about \$1,500, which was \$76,000 less than the \$1,576,000. Vaughan estimated would be required.

Rate is \$1.24

The township tax levy, not including the item for welfare, was set at \$1.24 per thousand, as compared with last year's rate of \$1.15, which was based on an assessed valuation of more than \$48,000,000, whereas the value this year is about \$30,500,000. The total tax levy for 1931-32 was \$34,878.16.

As informally approved by the Board two weeks ago, the proposed budget contained no provision for a road repair tax, which is assessed on property in the township outside incorporated limits. Estimated expenditures in the budget, which was drawn up by Lloyd B. Reid, township engineer, show that \$12,698.24 is allotted to the road repair fund this year, and that even if no tax were spread in this fund at all, there would still be a balance of \$774.40 on April 1, 1932.

Mr. Vaughan declared the estimates were incorrect, and voted for the 50 cent levy on that ground. James V. Bayley, township clerk, and Judge Floyd S. Buck, also favored the tax, but on the grounds that the money being raised this winter is for next year's expenditures, and that a \$947 balance on April 1 would not be sufficient to meet the requirements of the fund. "We've always done it that way," they declared.

Levinson Opposes Tax

Justice David Levinson pointed out that the budget is dated from April 1, 1932, to April 1, 1933, and maintained that "the Board has no right, moral, legal or otherwise, to assess taxes to carry beyond the first of next April." His contention was supported by Floyd Blakeley, township attorney, but he was opposed, 3 to 1, when the vote was taken.

The rate was established at 50 cents per thousand on the advice Wilson, who admitted that the original budget provided amply for needs of the fund to April 1, but sided with Mr. Bayley and Judge Buck in arguing that the budget should be dated for advance expenditures.

The Board also approved the levying at the rate of 50 cents per thousand, of a tax for fire protection in the portion of the township outside incorporated limits. A hearing will be held Wednesday at which time the Board will entertain objections to the assessment. There is no highway improvement tax levy in the new budget.
