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Basketball, Hockey, Fencing And Club Athletics Get Under Way At Cranbrook

Thompson, director of athletics, three varsity groups and six non-varsity squads are expected to have 185 boys enrolled in the school.

The organization was the 1932-1933 basketball team, coached as it was last year, by E. J. Pennessy, and W. B. Rieckert. Between eight and nine teams are expected for the first practices, including four letter men from last year's team. A schedule of 10 games has been set, covering a period from Jan. 17 to Mar. 4.

Varsity hockey coaches, G. T. Nickerson and V. S. Keitt, drew 35 players to practice Monday, but because there was no hockey last year, four regulars and two substitutes from Cranbrook's previous squad were brought in from the back benches of the present squad, led by Captain Ernest Devlin of Detroit. Although the cast calls for only 13 characters, nearly 80 students, the complete enrollment of the class, are being used in the production.

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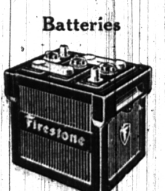
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
