

SCOUTS PLAN PAPER DRIVES

Will Collect Old Publications in Campaign To Meet Deficit

In an effort to make up a deficit in their budget, Birmingham Boy Scouts are planning a series of bi-monthly paper-to-home drives of the community to collect old papers and magazines the first to be held Saturday, Dec. 3.

Julius P. Wenzl, president of the District Boy Scout committee, outlined the plan for the project. "Except for small donations of money from organizations," Mr. Wenzl said, "the Boy Scouts are entirely self-supporting. They have never solicited funds from the public for their benefit."

The expense of maintaining the local troops is quite small, since no salaries are paid to executives of the local organization, all of whom donate their time and services outright. "Nevertheless, there are some items of expense, and these are always met by the scouts themselves through some such means as this collection of old papers and magazines now being planned. By this method, following probably twice each month, we hope to offset the present deficit in our budget."

Besides urging residents of the community to save their old papers and magazines and have them available for the scouts on the day of the canvass, Mr. Wenzl also issued a plea to business organizations and others for the use of their trucks in collecting the material.

The actual canvassing is expected to be done by the scouts between the hours of 8 a. m. and noon, Mr. Wenzl said, adding that the organization hopes to realize between \$50 and \$75 from the sale of the papers it collects.
