Mrs. Shain Will Represent State At Conference For Cause and Cure of War

Mrs. Charles J. Shain, student of international affairs, will represent the State Marathon Round Table at the National Conference for the Cause and Cure of War, at the annual meeting of the Association of United Women and Conference to be held in Washington, D. C., from Jan. 16 to 20.

Mrs. Shain was selected by representatives of the 17 Round Tables organized in the State of Michigan under the chairmanship of Miss Elina Coupa of Detroit as their official delegate at the Washington Conference. Chosen as alternate with Mrs. Shain, were Mrs. Frederick Fisher of Ann Arbor and Mrs. J. C. Mellicham of Marquette.

As a result of a movement instituted by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, the Round Tables for Peace were organized in 46 states under auspices of the National Conference. The Conference is a steering committee for the 12 leading women's organizations in this country, which comprise the units of the group.

Together with the 46 delegates from Round Tables in other states, Mrs. Shain will convey the findings of her state to Washington, to be submitted to the National Round Table for consideration. The findings of the National Round Table will then be submitted to the Conference as a committee report, to be used in part as a national peace program for the coming year by the 12 units of the Conference.

Township Generous To Red Cross, Chairman Says

Bloomfield Township has contributed more than \$500 to the Red Cross to date, as a result of the Roll Call conducted in the township and the direction of Mrs. Harold H. Corson.

The report is not yet complete, Mrs. Corson points out, as several sections are still to make returns.

"It is an incident the total will exceed \$1,000," Mrs. Corson said. "This splendid result represents both the confidence the people have in the Red Cross and the untiring efforts of the women who assisted in the door-to-door canvass."

"The more than 40 women who conducted the Roll Call carried on in spite of illness and inclement weather."

The Roll Call will continue until reports from all sections of the township have been completed, Mrs. Corson said. Those not at home when the sections conducting the canvass called, are requested to send their subscriptions to Mrs. Corson's home, 316 West Maple.

The total subscribed in last year's Roll Call amounted to \$1,183.
