

COMMUNITY HOUSE MAINTAINS SERVICE

Reduced Budget Fails To Slacken Welfare Work Or General Activities

Despite its reduced budget, the Community House succeeded in maintaining its full quota of welfare work and service to the community in general during November, according to statistics compiled in the monthly report of its activities, as presented to the meeting of the Community House Board Monday evening.

The report shows that 565 articles of clothing were distributed to needy families through the welfare department, of which 242 were new garments collected in the Needlework Guild's in-gathering.

In addition, 134 office interviews were granted to welfare subjects, 50 houses were visited by the social worker, 16 persons were transported to clinics, 300 quarts of milk were distributed and four families were given emergency food relief.

Of 900 cut garments turned in by the Red Cross, 408 were finished by women's organizations in sewing meetings at the House and returned to the Red Cross.

Permanent employment was found for 55 persons, the report shows, and 99 odd jobs were also provided. A total of 8,760 persons used the House during the month, and 142 meetings of various organizations were held there.

Junior, Senior M. E. Groups Will Be Assisted by Soloists And Trio

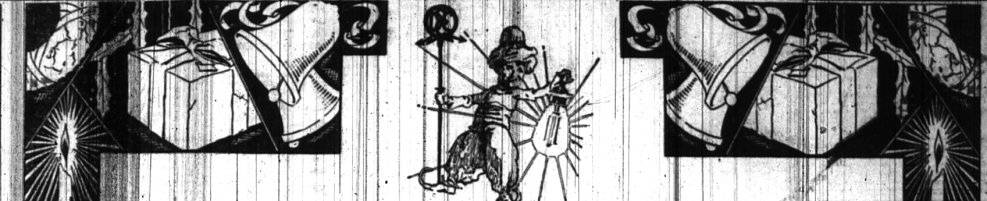
