

85,000 EMPLOYED ON '33 CHEVROLET Production of New Models Calls for Complete Normal Working Force

With the announcement of the new Chevrolet 1933 models, there was no need for employment for more than 12,000 workers in the plants and assembly of the Chevrolet Motor Company, according to W. S. Kirkham, president and general manager.

The number represents a complete normal working force. Mr. Kirkham explained that about 20,000 are on the Chevrolet payroll in the company's 20 domestic plants.

Mr. Kirkham said that assembly of 100,000 cars had gotten under way in November and early December and that all eight plants are now fully staffed and turning out the new line in gradually increasing volume.

3. Remember that when trees are cut they dry and rapidly become more inflammable each day they are in the house.


