The special appearance will take the form of a puppet show, under the direction of the national secretary of the national French Circles, and presented by the Birmingham French Circles.

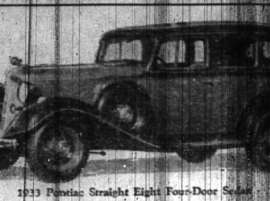

Improvements to be initiated by petition signed by owners of 51 percent of the abutting property...

The new charter would also provide for a system of budget control which would make it mandatory for the Commission to restate its budget each three months...
