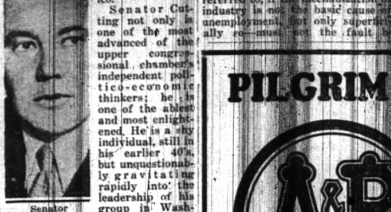

Circumstances To Guide Roosevelt After March 4

Senator Cutting Believes Next President Will Not Attempt Definite Program

WASHINGTON.—If any man in public life is pre-eminently qualified to express progressive-labor hopes and expectations of the coming Roosevelt administration it is Senator Bronson Cutting, of New Mexico.



Senator Cutting is not only one of the upper congressional chamber's independent political thinkers; he is also one of the most enlightened and most unambiguously progressive in the leadership of his group in Washington. Incidentally, he is a Grover Cleveland and Harvard product, precisely like the president-elect, magnificently educated and in office as a conscript, not from any motive of personal interest or ambition.

Senator Cutting is regarded as among those best acquainted with plans for the White House term beginning Mar. 4.

"MY UNDERSTANDING," said the senator, in response to my query as to his views concerning the policies best suited to rescue the difficult situation through which it is struggling, "is that Governor Roosevelt has not a definite program, though naturally he is intensively studying the problems with which he soon will be required to deal."

AND he will have a program formulated by inauguration day? Or will he be guided by circumstances and developments?
"He has not much choice," rejoined the New Mexican, with a smile.

HOWEVER, the question I had put related especially to the senator's own idea of the wisest course to pursue in the midst of existing national distress and outright peril—and I ventured to remind him of the "Well," answered the southwestern lawmaker, slowly, "the conditions we face must be met immediately and to meet them immediately I see no alternative to the adoption of what, I suppose, can be more or less accurately described as palliatives."

"At the last congressional session, it will be recalled that I pushed a bill providing for public works on a large scale, to create employment."

"A shortening of the working day also will restore many of the jobs destroyed by the mechanization of industry. This also is an urgent necessity."

"I don't contend that these measures are fundamental, but they will give speedy results and speedy results are imperative. We can't have starvation."
