RELICS RECALL PAST HISTORY

Franklin Antiques Date Back More Than Century And A Half

More than a century and a half of history, much of it concerning the olden days of the South, is reflected in a collection of valued and tradition-bound relics and antiques now on display in the window of Ben Wood's general store in Franklin.

The collector has gathered around a nucleus of several articles of historical significance owned by William Jones, Mr. Wood's assistant in the store, who was instrumental in convincing the display with contributions of articles of historical interest from the homes of other residents of the community.

Among the most interesting of the articles are an antique great lamp, 178 years old, and a British Kerosene lamp of newer and alloy. Believed to be one of the first of its kind ever made.

There are three soap and ball pistols, all about 1800, and a number of musket loading caps and ball rifles, one of which dates back 114 years. The display of arms also includes a Spanish cutlass seized on a ship in the Gulf of Mexico in the year of 1812.

Included among the objects by President Martin Van Buren in 1838 for a piece of property in Lapeer County is displayed along with a University of Michigan catalogue for the year 1849-50, a walking stick that carried the name of Michigan graduates of the class of '79, a Franklin jacket of the period of the Civil War, and a remarkable statue of a California gold prospector in 1853 to a resident of Franklin, and an interesting article in the exhibit.
