

# FATHER-SON WEEK NOTED

## Banquets, Church Services To Mark Annual Observance Here

Banquets and special services in several different Birmingham churches during the next 10 days will mark the annual observance of Father and Son Week here.

Although the Y. M. C. A. is not sponsoring and concerted observance of the period this year as in the past, churches have been encouraged individually to commemorate the Father-Son spirit in services for their members.

The first event will be a Father-Son banquet at St. James Episcopal Church Friday evening at which Harlow N. Davock, local contractor, will be the speaker. He will describe his experiences while hunting wild game in Africa.

About 200 guests are expected to be entertained at a similar banquet in the First Baptist Church Monday evening. An address on Lincoln will be delivered by Judge

E. J. Millington of Cadillac. A special Father-Son service will be held in the Baptist Church Sunday evening, Feb. 21, when the Detroit Harmonica band, composed of 25 young colored musicians, will entertain.

The Men's Club of the First Methodist Church will sponsor a Father-Son banquet to be held there Friday, Feb. 19. Rev. W. Hamilton Antebach, assistant pastor of Christ Church Cranbrook, will be the speaker, and immediate payment in full of the member's dues. Arrangements are in charge of a committee composed of Leo I. Gibbons, G. A. Ziegler, John D. Maynard, William A. Daise, Victor Peck and George G. Steelman.

The United Presbyterian Church will also sponsor a banquet in observance of Father and Son Week, although the date has not been selected. It was announced yesterday by Rev. Henry S. Evans, the pastor.

Nearly every church in the village will hold special Father and Son services either next Sunday or the Sunday following.

## Seeks Nomination As Congressman From New 17th

Advocating removal of the eighteenth Amendment, adoption of a sales tax and prosperity loan and immediate payment in full of the soldier's bonus, John J. Schulte, Jr., Municipal Court Judge of Farmington, yesterday became the first candidate to enter the race for the Republican nomination as congressman from the new 17th district in the September primaries.

His nine-plank platform also included "vigorous enforcement of the Great Lakes to ocean project," economy in government, opposition to any future debt moratorium, and the "restoration of the economy of the country exclusively and directly by the Nation."

Judge Schulte has lived in Farmington for 7 1/2 years, six in 1921 to June 10, 1922, because of illness. He previously lived in Detroit.

At a regular meeting of the Trustees of School District No. 1, Fractional of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield Townships, Oakland County, Michigan, held on the 30th day of November, 1931.

Present: Ray A. Palmer, W. G. Hutchinson, John E. Martz, Earl G. Potter and Francis F. McKinney.

Resolved: None.

Resolution introduced by McKinney. Seconded by Martz.

WHEREAS, School District No. 1, Fractional of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield Townships, Oakland County, Michigan desires to borrow Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) in accordance with Act No. 26, Public Acts of 1931 of the State of Michigan, in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current fiscal year which began July 1, 1931, and which year an irrevocable appropriation has been made providing for the levying of tax amounting to Three Hundred Eighty-nine Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-five and 75/100 Dollars (\$389,235.75) for school purposes, and

WHEREAS, there has already been authorized a loan of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) against the current taxes of 1931 which began July 1, 1931, which all or part is outstanding, and

WHEREAS, the proposed loan of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) is approximately thirteen

percent (13%) of the tax levy of the current fiscal year.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the President and Secretary of the Board of Education of School District No. 1, Fractional of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield Townships, Oakland County, Michigan, be and hereby are authorized to borrow Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) on behalf of said school district and to sign notes therefor, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) of said notes to be dated December 1, 1931 and to become due March 1, 1932 and the other Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to be dated December 15, 1931 and to become due March 15, 1932. The number one to thirteen, inclusive. Notes numbers one to ten will be in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) and numbers eleven to thirteen in the denomination of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000). The December 15, 1931 notes shall be numbered fourteen to twenty-seven inclusive. Notes numbers fourteen and fifteen to be in the denomination of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars, sixteen to twenty-four to be in denomination of One Thousand (\$1,000) and twenty five to twenty-seven to be in denomination of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00).

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that the notes authorized herein shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, payable at maturity, both principal and interest to be payable to the Detroit Trust Company, Detroit, Michigan.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that there shall be set aside for the payment of this loan as received by the Treasurer of the District in a separate account, forty per cent (40%) of the first One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) cash collections on the 1931 levy and six per cent (6%) cash collection thereafter, and that whenever Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or more shall accumulate in said fund for the payment of the loan, the same shall be remitted to the Detroit Trust Company and be used for the payment of a proportionate amount of the outstanding notes.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that as part of the condition of this loan, it is understood that the payments on this loan shall not be subject to any other tax heretofore authorized by resolution dated October 27, 1931, and again on October 27, 1931, and that the date of the payrolls coming due shall have collected insufficient money to permit the school district to pay its salaries in full in cash. Provided, further, that the restrictions regarding the issuance of other notes authorized on October 27, 1931, shall not apply, and when the sum of \$50,000.00 herein authorized is fully repaid.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that the school district hereby reserves the right to pay any or all of said notes prior to maturity date on three days written notice to the purchasers of said notes if sufficient funds are available to pay one or more of said notes in its entirety.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that said notes shall be issued in substantially the following form:

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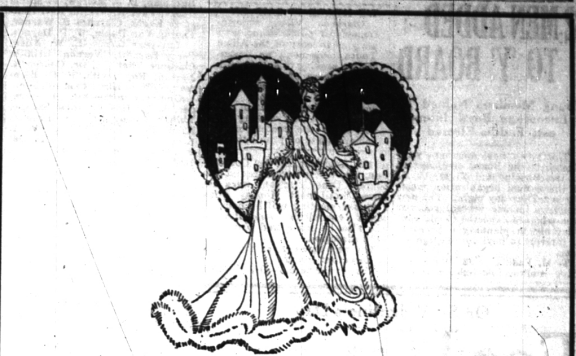
