GROSSE POINTE DROPS MAPLES

Millionaires Retain S.E.A.A. Lead With 35 to 11 Victory

Overcoming a slight Baldwin lead of the first quarter, Grosse Pointe High School's basketball quintet fortified its position at the top of the heap in the Southeastern League here Friday night by overwhelming the Maroon and White varsity, 35 to 11.

The outcome dropped the Maples from second to third place in the league standing, and left the Grosse Pointers undefeated for the season to date.

Baldwin led at the end of the first quarter 5 to 4, but a determined rally in the second period gave the Millionaires a 10-point advantage at the half, 17 to 7, from where they continued to increase their margin almost at will.

Baldwin Tankmen, Bowing To Monroe, Take Only One First

The Baldwin High School tankmen dropped their first meet of the season to Monroe Tuesday, 47 to 17. Captain John Botting took the only Maple first place by leading the field 20 yards in the 220-yard free-style event. It was Monroe's sixth win in seven starts.

The Baldwin swimmers lost the free-style relay only a yard, and the 40-yard free-style event was equally close. Hogan took second place in the latter race, while Botting failed by inches of raising his hand.

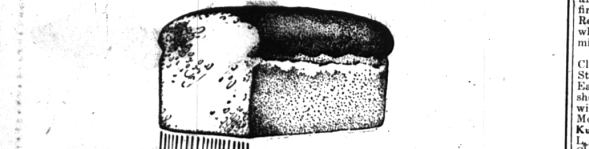
