Crack Amateur Talent Listed For Cranbrook Show Saturday

OAKLAND COUNTY DE MOLAYS UNITE

Birmingham, Royal Oak, Pontiac Chapters Organize Joint Council

Organization of the three Oakland County DeMolay chapters—Birmingham, Royal Oak and Pontiac—into a county chapter for the purpose of creating closer relationships among the chapters and encouraging interchapter activities in degree work, athletics and social functions, was completed at a meeting in the Birmingham Masonic Temple Saturday afternoon.

Each of the three chapters will be entitled to two representatives, who will handle the business of the organization, which chapter is known as the Oakland County DeMolay Council.

The representatives are Jack Warren, chairman, of Royal Oak; Rudolph Richards, vice-chairman, of Pontiac; Donald Parry, secretary, of Birmingham; Sanford Matten, treasurer, of Royal Oak; Dalbert Fear, of Birmingham; and Willis Beach, of Pontiac. Kenneth Goodell, "Dad" of the Pontiac chapter, will serve as advisor to the council officers.

Mar. 19 has been selected as the tentative date for the first annual convalescence of the council, to be held in Pontiac. The month of March was chosen for all future convalescences in order that the council might celebrate jointly the anniversary of the martyrdom of Jacques DeMolay, which occurred on Mar. 18, and the founding of the Order of DeMolay, the anniversary of which is Mar. 24.

POLICE ARREST 90 DRIVERS IN MONTH

Traffic Law Violators Numerous During January, Report Shows

Traffic ordinance offenders were again the chief object of police activity in January, the monthly report of Miss Carrie Stoddard, police clerk, shows.

Ninety persons were arrested for violating traffic regulations during the month, according to the report. These included 6 for reckless driving, 57 for speeding, 34 for violating traffic signals and 36 for illegal parking.

Others arrested for misdemeanors included six charged with being drunk, two with drunk driving and one with disorderly conduct. Only three persons were arrested

for felonies, one for assault and battery, another for breaking and entering and the third for uttering and publishing.

Fines collected at the Violations Bureau amounted to \$313, the report shows.

Twelve traffic accidents, resulting in injuries to five persons, occurred in the village in January, according to the report.

Police investigated 36 complaints and answered 27 calls. Nine persons were reported missing.

Three burglaries were reported during the month, one of which was cleared up by an arrest. One stolen automobile and goods stolen in one simple larceny were recovered.
