Status Of Oriental Art Group Will Hold Informal Reception Sunday

The treatment of orientals in America in comparison with the demands made by foreigners in China and other countries of the Far East, was discussed by Mrs. Harold S. Gray in a talk before members of the League of St. James Women at the parish house Wednesday.

The address was one of a series of educational talks sponsored by the League, and held each Wednesday at 11 A. M.

"Many of us do not stop to consider both sides of the question regarding our attitude toward the oriental races," Mrs. Gray explained. "In this country we accept the immigration laws excluding Chinese and Japanese without realizing the hardship they cause to the educated of those races who enter this country as students.

"After students finally enter the country and enroll at their chosen college or university, they have other obstacles to overcome. If there are not adequate dormitory facilities, they have difficulty in finding places in which to live.

"There is discrimination against them even when they belong to the most educated and desirable class of oriental. Contrast this treatment with the demands made by foreigners in the Orient. They insist upon concessions not controlled by the government of China or Japan, for settlements for their own race.

"The country and military protection while residing in these countries. As a result of the discrimination against the orientals in this country and the demands made of him in his country, there is a great deal of ill feeling."
