PORT HURON TOPS MAPLES

Visitors Extended To Win Bitter Defensive Battle, 27-20

The Baldwin High School eagles were defeated Friday evening on their own court by Port Huron in one of the best defensive contests of the season, the highly-touted invaders fighting evenly inch for its 27 to 20 victory. Bir-

mingham now holds fifth place in the Southeastern League.

Score Only Two Firsts, Bowing To Royal Oak, 32 to 23

Taking only two first places, the Baldwin team was defeated by Royal Oak Tuesday afternoon in the Acorn tank, 32 to 23. Captain John Botting continued undefeated in the 200-yard free-style event, leading the field by a full lap and bettering his time of the present season by eight seconds.

Fancy diving was omitted due to the lack of a spring-board. Lynch of Baldwin had been conceding a good chance of winning this event.

The only other first place taken by the visitors was in the 200-yard relay, with Manley Botting, Zimney Howard and John Botting swimming in the 200-yard relay. Royal Oak swimmers were disqualified for beating the gun in this event.

Lynch and MacDairmid swam second and third in the 50-yard freestyle race and finished in the same order in the 100-yard freestyle.

Botting was only inches behind Werner of Royal Oak in the backstroke century. Zimmer placed third.

Miller shaved three seconds off his time but had to be satisfied with a third place in the 100-yard breast-stroke.

To take the place of the fancy diving, a managers' race was held, with Farmer of Royal Oak defeating Drummond of Birmingham in a 200-yard free-style contest. A breast-stroke relay also was won by Royal Oak. L. Savage, Peabody, Pratt and Erickson swam for Baldwin. A great relay followed and was also won by the home team. Savage, Curry, Breisford and Anderson represented Baldwin.
