Who fears for the future happiness of the "average" American man because the "average" American woman is attracted by the flashing eyes and gallant manner of the Egyptian of Latin beauty.

What a Marjorie E. Porter Egyptian violet he is!

And so he takes it upon himself to warn American men to improve upon their method of love-making, a little more romance, he advises, is necessary to attract and hold American women.
