

FOR HEARS NORTON GRAY

Change in Plans Cancels Sherwood Eddy's Scheduled Appearance

In the absence of Sherwood Eddy, famous author and traveler, who was unable to come to Birmingham because of an unavoidable change in plans, William O. Norton, executive chairman of the Detroit Emergency Relief Committee, and Harold S. Gray, of Birmingham, addressed the People's Open Forum at a regular session in the Community House Monday night.

Mr. Norton outlined the prospects for state and national unemployment relief, while Mr. Gray described steps that have been taken by the Federal Government to stimulate business recovery and credit expansion.

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ington offers almost no hope that relief for unemployed workers will be forthcoming, and urged his listeners to appeal to Gov. Wilcox M. Bruce to include this matter in his schedule for the coming special session of the state legislature.

Describes Federal Reserve Mr. Gray opened his talk with a brief history of banking and an explanation of some of the fundamental banking functions. He described the Federal Reserve system, and outlined the problems faced by banks in 1929 through the deflation of stock and real estate values.

There is one outstanding advantage behind all this federal activity to bring about credit expansion," he declared. "It will go a long way toward restoring confidence, and will make new building programs possible.

He warned, however, that possible harm may also result from the move.

Wants of Danger "The acute danger is that it is an attempt to get security which is not the Federal Reserve Board speaking especially of liberalization of the Federal Reserve banking laws. Whether or not these laws will tend to be inflationary depends on how they are used.

Allied Youth Of America for Prohibition Secures Foothold in Oakland County

The Allied Youth of America for Prohibition, an organization of comparatively recent formation, gained its first foothold in Oakland County Saturday night when a group of about 40 young people of high school age met at the home of Mrs. Cyrenus A. Newcomb in Birmingham to discuss plans for a county-wide post.

The young people, who represented about 20 different communities in Oakland County, appeared enthusiastically over the possibility the organization presents for education in temperance, and agreed to attempt to obtain endorsements among their friends during the next two weeks.

The group will meet again on the evening of Saturday next at the home of Mrs. Newcomb, who is corresponding secretary for the executive committee of the organization in the Detroit district.

Speakers at the meeting last week were Mrs. Newcomb, Mrs. Charles J. Shain and Robert D. Loyd of Birmingham, George Kimball of Waterford and P. B. Runt of Pontiac.

Mrs. Newcomb explained that the Allied Youth of America for Prohibition was organized about four months ago, and is rapidly gaining in membership by the formation of posts all over the country.

REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, and shall UNDER OATH, state that he or she is a resident of said Village TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he or she possesses other qualifications of an elector under the Constitution; and that owing to sickness or bodily infirmity of himself, or some other member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Village on public business or his own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registration of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall, in said matter, wilfully make any false statement, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury and, upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.
