mount welfare needs will be for the remainder of the winter, and members of the committee agreed that these needs could be summed up under two heads:

1. Tactical provision for those families who find it almost impossible to subsist their pride to the extent of accepting relief, even though they are suffering fully as much as families on the regular welfare list.

2. Rehabilitation of families, and especially heads of families, who have been forced to accept charity for so long that their condition is likely to become chronic rather than spasmodic unless former habits of energy, ambition and initiative can be revived.

The meeting consisted for the most part of reports of sub-committee chairmen on the activities of their groups from the activities of the employment relief committee was established until the present.

Doty, whose condition was at first considered grave and who was believed to be suffering from a fractured skull, was rushed to the hospital in the Kimball-Bailey ambulance.

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WARNS AGAINST FAKE "GIRL SCOUT" AGENTS

A door-to-door campaign to sell candy or beg money for the purchase of Girl Scout uniforms was prosecuted as a fraud in Birmingham, was denounced yesterday as "strictly a case of imposture" by Mrs. L. A. White of Brookside drive, Girl Scout Commissioner.

"I wish to call the attention of Council members and other interested parties to the fact that these girls are not Birmingham Scouts, as questioning by council members who have been approached, revealed," said Mrs. White. "I doubt whether they are members of any Girl Scout troop."

Several incidents of girls going from door-to-door to sell candy or to beg money for the purchase of uniforms have been reported in Birmingham. This method is strictly against Girl Scout regulations. It is the wish of the council that any such imposture be reported to me, as such a campaign must be met by the council in fairness to Girl Scouts in good standing.
