Enters Race For 2-Year Term As Justice Of Peace

David Levinson, who last year was defeated by R. J. Corryell for township justice of the peace, issued the following statement:

"During the past few weeks many of my friends have urged me to be a candidate for justice of the peace to fill the vacancy. This office is important this year because it carries with it a seat on the Township Board for the coming two years."

"I believe this board should operate as would the board of a private corporation. It must stay within its income. It should not be dominated by any group or political faction. If I am elected it will be without any pre-election promises that I will perform the duties of the office to the best of my ability."

"A year ago I stood for justice of the peace, a reduction of salaries and the installation of a dependable accounting system. Some improvement has been accomplished along these lines but the work is far from completed. Taxes were come down even though some services have to be curtailed."

Mr. Levinson is 36 years old and is a long resident of Birmingham. He is assistant of the Charles Edwards Post of the American Legion Real Estate Board. He is a graduate of Birmingham High School and the University of Michigan Business Administration in the class of 1917. He is also a member of the Birmingham Masonic Lodge and Modern Temple, Detroit.

ANNUAL REPORTS OF COMMUNITY HOUSE

Sections of some of the reports of officers and committees of the Community House, read at the annual meeting Monday night, are given in full in early editions of The Eccentric.

WELFARE WORK

The first five months of the year we were obligated to the Village Commission for their support. We acted then as now as an investigator of all village cases applying for relief to the township office and for such cases as were referred to the Community House. Records were set up both in the Community House and the township office.

During the summer season, the work was continued but without a serviceable record. With the coming of fall the visitor's work was resumed under the direction of the township office and its financial support. We have continued our relation with the township office in making investigations, recommendations for relief, records, etc. We have assigned the responsibility of all home visits of families residing in the township. We feel that we have been of some assistance to the township supervisor in relieving him of this duty as well as serving our community. As the autumn months progressed, the village manager and Commission inaugurated a plan for an unemployment relief committee with sundry sub-committees of a volunteer nature to carry on a relief program for the great need they felt would be in our midst during the winter months.

The Community House at that time was well launched in its program of social service. Our records were made, and our needy families already visited, and with other private clubs we offered the committee all our facilities to assist them in carrying on their relief work.

In summing up our position in called particular attention to his altruistic spirit and his usefulness in giving support to numerous community enterprises.

and then furnished in the area sheets, pillow cases and bed blankets beyond the village and school limits. We have taken four to clinics in Detroit and having taken them personally there and paid such clinical fees as were required.

We have made two loans for home operating young children where parents preferred not to receive actual charity. We provided the necessary equipment to keep it going to make it possible for the child to recover from a severe illness. We provided visiting nurse's care in the home of a mother who was unable to care for her child.

We assumed in the May Day health program the responsibility of bringing to the clinic some 50 children for general physical examination. Through the efforts of one of our board members we were able, through a benefit party, to pay the expenses of an operation for a young girl. We provided cover oil for dozens of young children. We provided

visior insures a sense of security to the family in trouble. All this no doubt brings to one's mind the question of funds to carry on any program of relief or charity. We have been very generously assisted by a number of organizations, private individuals, both known and anonymous, to whom we are most grateful and for the most part such funds as we receive come to us unsolicited. The Birmingham Teacher's Shoe Fund has been our most recent donation and has filled a very much needed and much appreciated service. During the year we have made in our social service department 759 home visits and conducted approximately 400 office interviews. We have made records of cases and have them on file both in the Community House and the township offices. ARLENE LYNCH, Chairman
