Increasing Taxation

(Editor's note: Heretofore it has been assumed that the Michigan Legislature, in its session held in East Lansing on Jan. 22, 1932, had passed a law increasing taxation in early editions of The Eccentric.)

I was told that 10 minutes ago that from every citizen, it is necessary to consume that much time for such a purpose. A glimpse at your tax receipts will tell you quicker and more accurately than I can, and tell you in a manner that will make you realize what it means.

Taxation is a favorite theme these days. The newspapers are full of it, the politicians are yelling it from every rostrum. It's being talked about all over the nation, but, like Mr. Twain's weather, no one seems to be doing anything about it.

Instead of telling you about this increasing taxation, I'm going to tell you what I think ought to be done about it. Bear in mind that taxation is a favorite theme of a man, and may be very far from the correct solution of the trouble. However, it is a mark to shoot at, and if we can get enough persons interested in discussing the methods proposed, perhaps some reform may be on the road to a start. When I say "tax" I mean the tax on the property, not the assessments levied against real and personal property upon the tax rolls of the state.

Increases Cited
 While all of you are aware that taxes have increased since 1919, you may not be aware of just how much taxes have increased in a period of 15 years. It has been my duty to keep tab upon expenditures in Iron County for county purposes and to report to the taxpayer in the expenditure of public funds. I have, therefore, come into closer contact with expenditures in their primary stages than many of you, and have gathered considerable information and formed some rather definite opinions on the way taxes are being spent and how much of the expenditures may be eliminated. It is upon this foundation that I have made the following statement. They've been gathered on the firing line where I've met, sometimes in the trenches, through removal methods, but mostly by advice and persuasion, the army of tax spenders, and have been constantly advancing their positions on every front.

I have compiled some figures on an exhibit which my county and have secured others upon expenditures in the state that may be entering to you as a basis to start this discussion upon.

My county is, in population, about the average in size of the rural counties of the nation—a population of 20,000 people. It has three townships, three small cities, also seven township school districts. Each city and township has a population from which it was originally carved in the school unit.

Township Taxes
 My first table covers township taxes and the period is from the year 1914 to the year 1930, both inclusive. In 1914 there was raised and spent for township purposes in my county the sum of \$107,961.50. In 1930 there was raised and spent for township purposes in my county the sum of \$200,000.00.

The library and museum are open seven days a week on the new schedule, including the hours from 2 to 5 P. M. on Sunday. Visiting hours on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday are from 9:30 A. M. to 5:15 P. M.; on Tuesday from 8:30 A. M. to 5:15 P. M.; and on Saturday from 9:30 A. M. to Noon and 2 to 5 P. M.
