Small Blocs Constitute Our System Of Politics Rather Than Two Parties

WASHINGTON.—The sooner we recognize that our political system is not, nationally, a two party system, but a system of small blocs, the better it will be for the country.

The senator added: "And a far more satisfactory selection it probably would be, he observed, 'than we have much hope of getting by our present method.'"

"But I admit," he added, "that it is not a system which would be very well adapted to our present scheme of government."

"For that reason I foresee a constitutional convention in the not distant future, to effect adjustments better suited to our national requirements of today."

And giving more power to the president.

"No; less," said the senator, "and more to congress—probably reducing the president to the yoking of a purely administrative official."

THE QUESTION I had asked the New Mexican was: "Is there a prospect that voters, with such views as the folk who attended the progressives' conference in Washington last March, will have much choice between the two major parties' respective presidential candidates in 1932?"

"There doesn't appear to be a strong likelihood of it, does there?" replied the senator, pessimistically.

He did not discuss nomination probabilities on either side; simply accepted, without argument, the implied suggestion that neither ticket can reasonably be expected to be of a sort for progressives to rejoice over.

WHAT, then, must be the progressive problem's solution? Sooner or later. A party realignment?—into liberal and conservative? If so, why in there not a more pronounced tendency in the direction already? It is no new complaint, that the decline party have ceased to mean anything.

"The fact is," said Senator Cutting, "that two parties are not enough, national issues."

"Members of both houses of congress arrive here representing sufficiently clean-cut ideas. But once here they don't classify in any imaginable two ways—either as Republicans and Democrats or as liberals and conservatives. They break into half a dozen or more blocs, which coalesce and separate and form fresh combinations, as common interests draw them together or conflicting interests split them apart."

"CONGRESSIONALLY," continued the senator, "this process of give and take permits each shade of opinion to make its influence felt."

"However, at a national convention, with several different groups, striving for as many different and frequently contradictory points of principle, naturally there must be a compromise, which cannot possibly have any real significance."

"Inasmuch as this is equally true of both conventions, neither can have significant results."

"THE REMEDY," obviously," said the New Mexico lawmaker, "is the nomination of a national candidate of its own by each group which can come to terms with no other group except by oversteering the conditions of compromise."
