

# ORCHARD LAKE BOATS TO RACE

### Meet Royal Canadian Club Sunday in International Series

A regatta to the first international sailing race in Oakland County, started a year ago, when sailers of Orchard Lake County Club, Ontario, met with the Royal Canadian Yacht Club of Toronto, Ont., at Orchard Lake, will be the second race between the two clubs to be held at Lake Ontario, Saturday, July 23.

After winning a victory by three points a year ago, the Canadian Yacht Club issued an invitation to Orchard Lake this year to compete in a second international race. The invitation is held by the latter club to indicate that the event will be an annual affair.

If the weather is favorable, the race will be held at Lake Ontario; if the sea is too rough, the race will take place on the bay near the city.

The Royal Canadian Yacht Club is an organization of 1,500 members, divided into various forms of sailing. As the racing dinghies used at Orchard Lake are identical with those of the classes in which they sail by the Canadian Club, the Orchard Lake sailors will not transport their craft, but will race boats offered by their hosts.

This precedent was established a year ago when the Canadian sailors, mostly the craft owned by Orchard Lake, due to the expense and inconvenience of transporting their own.

The boats are 14 feet long and of the type known as international dinghies. They carry better than 120 square feet of canvas, and are distinctly a racing craft.

# STATE MAY SET GAS STANDARDS

1933 Legislature To Get Recommendations From Law Experts To Protect Motorist

**LANSING.**—Recommendations are to be made by the Department of State to the 1933 Legislature on a subject which is setting up standards for the various grades of gasoline offered to motorists in this state.

The only regulation which Michigan now has is the law prohibiting fraud and deceit in the sale of liquid fuels, including oils and similar products. "But this law does not give the motorist any knowledge of the type of gasoline he purchases, and it is possible for any number of different blends of liquid fuels to be offered to Michigan motorists as gasoline."

There are, in general, three standards for gasoline. These are high test, standard and complete. At present it is possible to get gasoline of the high test, another company's regular grade, and another company's regular grade at a lower price.

With standards, gasoline specifications set by the state, motorists would be certain to receive the quality of gasoline they pay for.
