

PRACKEN WINS TENNIS CROWN

Highland Park Youth Takes Junior Singles Title in Local Tourney

Richard Pracken, number one of the Highland Park High School tennis team, was the winner of the Junior singles title in the Birmingham Tennis Club's Open Tennis Tournament for juniors and boys, which ended yesterday. Pracken defeated Irving Richter in the final match with little difficulty, 6-3, 6-3.

Walter Kramer and Mortin Friedman, state junior doubles champions, won the doubles crown by defeating Dave Singer and Cecil Levy in another easy match, 6-3, 6-3. The boys' singles division developed the hardest fought match of the tournament, Robert Mix of Birmingham winning over Edward Gibbons, also of Birmingham, in three close sets, 3-6, 6-2, 6-2.

Richter, who held the national boys ranking of 16th in 1929, played an upset in the semi-final round of the junior division by defeating Walter Kramer, who won the Michigan junior singles crown at Cranbrook last May and who seeded number one in the Birmingham tournament.

In this match Richter played a steady game, making few drives or smashes but playing steadily. On the other hand, Kramer played the first set with indifferent attitude, seemingly not caring whether he won or lost. He showed marked improvement in the second set, but many of his drives landed outside or in the net.

In the third set each boy returned to a cautious, steady game. Richter led each set and each set, but Pracken's more extensive car with his service. Kramer's defeat was the first he has suffered in tournament competition this season.

Flower gardens will not be judged for prizes until later in the summer.

The contest is being sponsored by the Birmingham Branch of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association, in conjunction with several co-operating organizations in the community.
