

ORCHARD LAKE SAILORS LOSE

Drop Second International Contest To Canadians, 171 To 138

Repeating their victory of a year ago, the Royal Canadian Yacht Club of Toronto, Ont., defeated the sailors of Orchard Lake Yacht Club in the second of a series of international sailing races Saturday held in Toronto Bay.

Although the score was 171 to 138, it does not fully indicate the intense competition offered to their opponents by the Orchard Lake sailors laboring under the difficulty of strong blasts in foreign waters.

The races consisted of three separate contests, each around the three-mile bay, in length, with seven boats entered by each team in each race.

The Canadians won the first contest, 94 to 40, their margin of victory was narrowed to 55 to 30 in the second race, and they made a clean sweep by taking the third by a score of 52 to 43. The boats used were 14-foot international dinghies of the type sailed at Orchard Lake, but all owned privately by members of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club.

The seven Orchard Lake skippers were George S. Wiley, Robert

F. Grindler, C. Theron Van Dusen, Clyde C. Bennett, Vernon Myers, Warren S. Booth and Hugh Hitchcock. The seven in crews were composed of F. G. Fox, W. R. Crim, James R. Moss, Hal Brook, Paul Penhield and Hewitt Noble.

Both this year's races and those of last summer when the Canadians defeated the Orchard Lake sailors for three points on the leaders' home waters, were so successful and developed so much friendly rivalry and interest that they are almost certain to become an annual event, according to Mr. Hitchcock, who said the Canadian sailors are already getting to return to Orchard Lake in 1933.

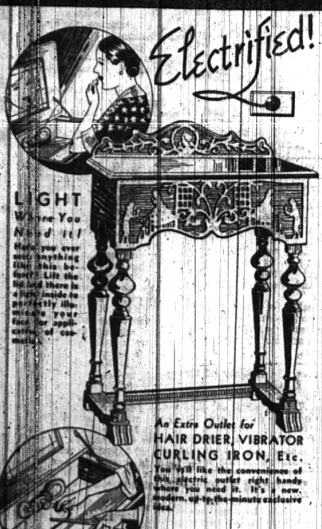
