

YOUTH BADLY HURT IN CRASH

Golf Club Employee In Serious Condition After Collision

Cecil Daley, 21 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Daley of Twelve Mile road, was still in a serious condition in Redford Hospital yesterday as the result of an automobile collision Monday morning at Thirteen Mile road and Northwestern highway.

Daley on his way to work at the Franklin Hills Golf Club, was driving east on Thirteen Mile road when his car collided with another, travelling north on Northwestern highway, driven by James Ward, a Negro employed at the home of S. A. Cogdell of Orchard Lake.

Daley suffered a possible fractured skull and failed to regain consciousness until late Monday night. He was taken to the hospital by a passing motorist.

Ward was uninjured except for minor cuts and bruises, while Beatrice Kemp, a Negro riding

with him, sustained arm injuries, cuts and bruises, and suffered from shock. She and Ward were removed to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, in the Kinball-Bailey ambulance.

Daley has been well known and popular with many friends in and around Franklin for several years. He is a regular member of the Franklin team in the commercial division of the Birmingham V. M. C. A. softball league.

The accident was investigated by Deputy Sheriff William Parris of Farmington.

CARS HERE TO GET BRAKE INSPECTION

Garages To Make Free Tests In State-Wide Drive

As part of a state-wide check-up of automobile brakes and equipment, Birmingham motorists will have an opportunity during the month of August to have their cars inspected free of charge at local garages to be designated officially by Chief of Police John P. Brackett in cooperation with the Michigan Safety and Traffic Directors Association of Lansing.

The garages will be furnished with standardized inspectors and report forms to be turned over to the state on completion of the inspections. Where a car has been inspected and its brakes and steering device are found to be in good condition an official sticker will be given a sticker to be placed on his windshield.

There will be no charge necessary to Chief Harbor, but beginning in September motorists will be required to have their cars inspected, and owners whose cars do not conform to state regulations on brakes will be liable to arrest.

Garages will be asked to make the inspection free of charge, although of course they will be allowed to charge for necessary repairs.

In Birmingham all garages which care to perform the inspection service will be designated officially for the work. Chief Brackett said that the garages are that there will be for 50.

Boys Enjoy Program Of Sports, Games And Crafts At First Cranbrook Play School

Swimming, group games, wood-working and a host of other activities are included in the program arranged by George T. Nickerson and his assistants for the 38 boys enrolled in the first annual Cranbrook Summer Play School here in session every morning except Saturday from 9 till 12.

The boys, whose ages range from 6 to 13, are mostly residents of Birmingham and the Hills, but a few live in the Palmer Woods section in Detroit, according to Mr. Nickerson, a Cranbrook instructor who is director of the school. His assistants are Howard Wert of the Latin department

at the school, Dick Sims, a Livock, Jack Cockran, Jim Peterson and Wally Heaventree.

Divided into five groups, the boys are divided into groups according to their ages, size and ability. In this way it is possible for the instructors to give the more individual attention in their various classes. No academic work is attempted, a project approach being the procedure in the Cranbrook School play school under the direction of George Cockran, upper class student at Cranbrook. Later in the year, some manual instruction in handicraft class is given in connection with their work.

The regular schedule which is not rigidly adhered to, includes the shop class, outdoor group games when the weather permits or classes in the gymnasium, swimming instruction and a free swimming period. The group is divided into two teams for the games, and the individual boys for team points. Mr. Nickerson is the leader of the swimming class, in which he is assisted by Shaw and Ferron, who stand the floor to assist the boys in their attempts to swim. Awards are made to the boys for athletic and other degrees of excellence in the water.

What Cranbrook Unites is? Occasionally a special program is replaced by a group of one of the departments of the school. For instance, the group was recently taken to the University of the Sciences Institute. At another time they visited Floral Church, Cranbrook, and saw the mechanism of the organ and organ. Two-reel films of comedy or travel pictures are sometimes shown to the boys.

As the program indicates, the aim of the project is to promote friendly rivalry and team spirit among the youngsters in a healthy and sane way.

The six-week term of the school will come to a close Aug. 12 at which time the best students in a large athletic meet. Special awards will be made to the three boys in each group who distinguish themselves in their work and play.
